Dr. Michael Bakan, Professor of Ethnomusicology at FSU.

Neurodiverse Dialogues on Life, Music, and Autism. The importance of music in the lives of autistic individuals has been recognized virtually since the advent of autism as a diagnosed condition. In this presentation, renowned ethnomusicologist Michael Bakan explores the autism-music nexus not in the usual terms of pathology and intervention, but rather with respect to how musical people who are autistic express their own views on the subject, and on many others besides. Drawing from his new book, *Speaking for Ourselves: Conversations on Life, Music, and Autism*, Bakan, mainly through the words of his autistic musician collaborators, offers a new conception of what it means to be musical, what it means to be autistic, and what it means to be human.
